

Invitation to Attend: National Sixties Scoop Exhibit Coming to the Prince George Public Library on June 1, 2022



The Sixties Scoop Indigenous Society of Alberta (SSISA), in partnership with the Prince George Public Library (PGPL), are bringing the Bi-Giwen: Coming Home – Truth Telling from the Sixties Scoop travelling exhibit to various BC locations, including the traditional territory of the Lheidli T'enneh.


We would like to invite you to attend the Opening Ceremonies on Wednesday, June 1st, 2022, at 10:00am at the Prince George Public Library's Bob Harkins Branch, downtown. We would be honoured to have you attend on behalf of the Prince George Public Library as this is a major step towards reconciliation with Indigenous people. If for whatever reason you are unable to attend it would be appropriate for you to send someone attend on your behalf.

The Sixties Scoop Indigenous Society of Alberta (SSISA) is moving forward with a major public awareness campaign in BC. SSISA has identified six locations in BC to begin the Public Awareness and we have identified Prince George as one of our stops. The first of its kind exhibit shares the experiences of survivors, including twelve personal testimonials of strength and resilience. The powerful display (developed for ages 13+) will be accessible to the public free of charge at the, on Wednesday, June 1st from 10:00am-5pm.

The goal of the Public Awareness Campaign is to educate mainstream Canadians on the legacy and atrocities of Sixties Scoop in Canada as it is a part of the history of the Indigenous people in Canada.
